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CHRISTMAS MESSAGE 2022

Some race of people regret the fact that they have lost the beautiful gift they call CULTURE, that they once had and lived. The Shepherds and magi, after seeing the Lord of Christmas, did not go on a shopping spree or did they decide to keep Christmas for themselves. They left Jesus, Mary and Joseph with full hearts; they left glorifying God for the greatest gift they ever received; a gift they paid not even one cent for.

This is our story of Christmas, given to us by God and is handed on to us by those witnesses who committed themselves to glorying God forever; witnesses who were committed to be guided by the Star and not by the changing world around them, telling them what's in and what's not; telling them to throw away that which truly gives life.
